Labrador Retriever



Breed History

The Labrador Retriever is one of the most common breeds of dogs owned in America

and can trace its lineage back to 16th century Newfoundland. They were the fishermans' working dog, helping to carry ropes to the boats and retrieving fishing nets in the water. The Labrador's predecessor, the St. John's Water Dog, had tuxedo markings of a white chest, feet, chin and muzzle. This trait will occasionally be expressed in modern day Labradors with a white spot on the chest



(which is known as a medallion) or stray white hairs on the feet and muzzle.

Valued for its loyal and brave personality, the Labrador Retriever is the quintessential dog. Friends with everyone, the Labrador makes a great family dog. Labradors love being outdoors and need plenty of exercise. They are excellent at the job they were bred to do; retrieving. If your family is not active hunters, then Labradors will retrieve sticks and balls to fulfill that natural instinct.

- ✓ Hip Dysplasia
- ✓ Elbow dysplasia
- ✓ Exercise Induced Collapse
- √ Hypothyroidism



- ✓ Laryngeal Paralysis
- ✓ Ear Infections
- ✓ Foreign Body Ingestion

Preventative Care Recommendations

Because Labradors are prone to ear infections, an owner should begin cleaning and handling the ears when they are puppies. This way when the ears are painful with an infection, they will be more tolerant.

Keep Labrador Retrievers at a lean body weight. Obesity can make joint problems such as hip dysplasia and respiratory problems such as laryngeal paralysis worse. Labradors shed a lot! Regular brushing is helpful.

Labradors are happiest when they get to retrieve and have lots of exercise every day.
